

"When the Rapist is Her Partner"

AN INTIMATE PARTNER SEXUAL VIOLENCE TRAINING WORKSHOP

Duration: Full or half-day as preferred by hosts.

Introduction:

Intimate Partner Sexual Violence (IPSV) represents the overlap between domestic violence and sexual assault. Studies reveal IPSV to be the most prevalent form of sexual assault, entailing the highest level of physical injury, and as carrying more serious long-term effects than stranger rape. IPSV concurrent with physical violence is also more likely to result in fatality than violence alone. Despite these factors, it remains the most underreported form of sexual assault. When women who have experienced IPSV seek help, it is frequently minimised or ignored by counselling, medical, legal and clerical professionals. IPSV is still surrounded by many myths about "real" rape, and many people, including survivors themselves, may accept these myths, which allow IPSV to flourish unchecked, and the danger to women to continue.

Yet, the high proportion of women who have experienced this crime, plus the dangers to them, make IPSV urgent to address. This dynamic and interactive training workshop, **designed for a maximum of 30 participants**, will familiarise professionals with different aspects of IPSV, and arm them with strategies for addressing it when they intersect with survivors.

Take-Aways:

Each participant will receive a handout packet containing a USB stick laden with resources to assist in future work with IPSV, and a certificate of participation.
